Letter from your Vicar

A vicar with failing eyesight glanced at a note that Mrs Jones had sent to him. The note read: "Bill Jones having gone to sea; his wife desires the prayers of the congregation for his safety." Failing to observe the punctuation, the vicar announced: "Bill Jones, having gone to see his wife, desires the prayers of the congregation for his safety." And thus, the rumours started.

Very few will have failed to notice the increase in the cost of living we have experienced in recent months and the most startling increases for most of us are represented by our gas and electricity bills. Whilst the government is apparently spending many billions of pounds to soften the effects of increased energy costs November has seen a doubling of household prices. This is on top of what were already significant price increases over the previous year, and it seems there are more increases on the way.

The government is also providing some assistance to businesses and charities (which includes Churches) though this help is significantly less generous. This presents quite a challenge to our four parish Churches. If we continue as normal and use the same amount of energy as we did last year our collective annual bill is likely to be increased by tens of thousands of pounds per year for at least the next couple of years.

So, what should we do? We could seek to increase our income to cover the additional costs but, while this will need to be a part of the answer, simply asking people for more and more money especially when the cost of living is increasing so quickly can't be right. We need to try and reduce our spending particularly on energy and the only way to do this in the short term is to reduce the amount of energy that we use.

There have been various suggestions as to how we might achieve this including the distribution of hot water bottles and blankets. However, the most realistic suggestion seems to be that, for the coldest months being January, February, and March, we do not open all four Churches every Sunday morning. Options as to how and if we should do this will be considered at our Parochial Church Council meeting on Wednesday the 30^{th of} November so, a decision will have been made by the time that you read this magazine. I am very aware that this is not a first-choice option for many and wish to be clear that all four Churches will be open as usual from Easter Day (9th April).

I recently received an email that said: "This is our saying of the day after someone asked what I thought about the church closing for 3 months" "we are not closing churches we are doing this to keep our churches open."

I can't begin to express how much I agree with and support this response. The closing of any Church causes me real personal sadness, and this would of course be all the greater if the Church in question were one of ours.

Last year, the congregation at Christ Church, Helme chose not to meet for a while because they were waiting for their heating system to be repaired. A number of people, including brides who had weddings booked contacted me destressed because they had heard a rumour that the Church had closed.

Please let's all listen carefully to what is being said, observe the punctuation, and recognise the spirit with which it is said. Rumours can be damaging and cause genuine hurt and distress, so let me repeat:



"It's not as picturesque as the old steeple but it's saving a fortune in electricity bills!

"We are not closing churches we are doing this to keep our churches open."

REVERSE ADVENT CALENDAR



On the days leading up to Christmas, starting on the first of December, what joy! A cardboard Advent Calendar brightly decorated with concealed cardboard doors to open one by one on the days leading up to Christmas. Of course this one treasure was shared between me and my big sister with Mum having to resolve many issues as to whose turn it was and who got to open the best and biggest, door number 24.

Having searched the Net, I now know that the first advent calendars were produced in Germany in the early 1800s but not the cardboard type that I first knew. I also found out that the production of the Calendars was put on hold on the outset of World War II as paper and cardboard was limited. Reading through the same article on the Net it concluded by saying that 'the religious meaning of Advent Calendars has been lost'. Perhaps that is true so a couple of years ago here at St Mary's Wilshaw we decided to do a **Reverse Advent Calendar**. We would buy an item of food, tins or non-perishable goods and instead of opening that cardboard door in our calendar, each day we would put a food item away and bring what we had saved to Church on Sunday. After Christmas, everything that we had collected was taken down to the Food Bank in Meltham for distribution.

So I hope that this has given you 'food for thought '. We are doing the same thing again this year...

the Meltham Crossroads Project Charity having sent nearly £1400. The money was used for buying necessary food, clothes, shoes, clean water and medical help etc. We pray for everyone. A huge thank you from the bottom of our hearts. Humanity unites us all. Your support was extremely appreciated. Take care xx '



'When I was choosing a reliable person to deliver our support I thought, things like having knowledge of the flood area where help hadn't been reached due to the roads being damaged. My dad's friend who does charity work, but on a smaller regular scale came to my mind. He was honoured to do something for the Crossroads people. His exact words were "Great are the people of United Kingdom, feeling the suffering of Pakistani so far away. This shows humanity is superior "



He knew the area that help didn't get to by any other aid work. He gathered few volunteers and they bought necessary food, clean water, books, clothes, shoes, blankets, mosquito nets and arranged a medical team with medicines to help. The team collected and delivered within a week. The response was amazing from the people receiving aid. Some were in tears that in UK the community care so much. Others picked their hands to pray for Meltham people.

Then a group prayer was offered as a way to thank everyone involved in this project. Every face was satisfied with relief. Flood affected people want to thank you for your support and the hope they have today. They send love and well wishes for you all.'

MELTHAM MUSTARD SEED UPDATE.

'My view is the sustainability project is now stable and steadily growing. The sugarcane fields are doing well and the three of them have been harvested already. 2 fields our own KMSYA (mustard seed young adults).

The project has purchased a plot of land using the returns from the sugar cane. We will build small houses to rent. Many sugar factories have now been constructed hence creating a lot of sugarcane demand hence reducing on the harvest age. (last year harvesting was very late and this affected the expected returns from the crop). We have high hopes of sustainability if we construct the rental houses in addition to the sugarcane. We shall build up to the proposed 21 hectares but after the second harvest. Then on our third harvest we can shall start building rentals in our purchased land once we have sufficient funding. We hope to do some fundraising when we start building. But of now the economy is still unstable and many of us are still fitting in it. But we hope to stabilize on our second harvest and after consolidating some good amount of money for school fees like for two years, we can start building.' Fred Nyakana, Coordinator and leader of sugar growing initiative.



Edison (left), Baikem and Kato Stephen who were in further education have completed this year. Edison graduated in engineering, Stephen our medical student has passed his final year exams and he is now under internship. Baikem did a diploma in civil engineering and has since joined the police force.

Members of KMS are hoping to visit us next year to join in the final annual coffee morning and sponsored walk. Saturday July 15th. As MMS withdraws it will be good to celebrate here in Meltham after our first involvement - to sink a fresh water bore hole in the village, as the nearest (contaminated) water source

was a walk of 4 miles. The bore hole was officially opened in 1992 by John Bakanoba and visitors from Meltham. Subsequently MMS kindred foster care was created in 1996.

Pupils of Mustard Seed School in Kyema, Uganda, on Speech Day. Although the nursery is not formally part of Mustard Seed, we have worked and helped there, contributed to the buildings and seeing it grow. According to Emmanuel, one of our friends in Kyema. "On speech day this is when the Head Teacher and the school management give a full report of the school year finished to the parents and other dignitaries invited. Awarding of presents and awards to best performing pupils. The pupils also do entertain the parents and visitors".

St. Mary's Report

On 23rd October Rev Judy led a service of Holy communion in the Sunday school (much warmer). Unfortunately, due to illness and technical difficulties we were unable to share the service with our zoom friends that week but three of them joined us at church. We heard about what a special gift the Bible is because it teaches us how to live in harmony with one another and it shows Jesus to us. There was no service on 30th October to give us the chance to attend the Parish communion at St. James' church.

Lay Reader Jacqueline France led a morning service the following Sunday when Lucy read the lesson on zoom. We watched a video in place of one of the hymns. Jacqueline reminded us that Jesus will make everything new and that the best is yet to come. On 13th November Rev Judy led a service of Remembrance at St Mary's. There were people in church and on zoom. Shirley Langrick spoke about the visit she and her husband Neville made to the war graves in France. (Shirley 's Great uncle Rufus Crampton and Nevilles Great uncle Charles Langrick were killed in France) so this was a moving visit for them. It was good to welcome John Fox and Mr and Mrs Peter Foden who represented the Royal British Legion. Following the national anthem Peter Foden laid the wreath on the war memorial and John Fox lowered the standard as we observed two minutes silence. This service took place at 2pm to allow us to support the united Remembrance service in Meltham. Our thanks go to all those who have read lessons, provided music, led prayers and prepared services over the last few weeks.

United Parish Communion service

How wonderful it was to share in this service as congregations from all 4 churches in our parish came together to worship God and to share Holy communion. St James' Church were our hosts and folk from Christ Church Helme (the "Rainbow Church") welcomed us and led the worship. Rev John was celebrant assisted by Irene Harrop who also led the prayers. Moyra Miller and Janet Rockett read the lessons. Rev John spoke about being united, not just in church but in the rest of our lives and reminded us that if our worship in church and our ministry out in the world is sincere and loving Jesus will be with us. God however does not appreciate empty words and insincere hearts so beware. With this in mind we were asked to pray about how we address the steeply rising costs of heating our churches this winter. It was good to see the church so full with people upstairs and in the crèche and fellowship was shared following the service, over coffee and cake provided by the folk from St James'. At these difficult times this service stood out as a beacon of hope - a light shining in the darkness - **thank you so much**

Bell House Report

Rev Judy led a service at Bell House on Wednesday 9th, as we remembered those who have died as a result of war. We sang two hymns and heard readings from the book of Malachi and St John's gospel. It was particularly moving as one of the residents was remembering his father Arthur who died in the 2nd World War and another resident was thinking about her uncle Albert who was also killed in the war. Rev Judy led the prayers and we observed 2 minutes silence.
