

Letter from your Vicar

Two kings, a new bishop, and an AGM (our annual parochial church meeting)

These things may bring many thoughts and images to mind. For some there is interest or even excitement. For others disinterested confusion as they ask themselves "what's it all about"?

As we head into April the Church is getting ready to celebrate Easter and the crowning of our heavenly king, Jesus. This brings to mind strange and disturbing images. Yes, we celebrate his resurrection on Easter Sunday, but first we must face the images of him being beaten, whipped, crowned with thorns, and crucified to death on the cross.

Jesus's crowning on Good Friday is in stark contrast to what we expect to see at King Charles' coronation on the 6th May. A cathedral with choirs, bishops, and hundreds (if not thousands) of dignitaries. His crown will be made of gold and encrusted with precious gems rather than Jesus's crown of thorns. I imagine the crowds will shout "long live the King" whilst crowd around Jesus shouted "crucify him".

In the Church of England, we recognise both Jesus and Charles iii as our king. And, regardless of the differing images of the two occasions, we hope for a particular similarity in attitude and approach to being king.

In chapter 9 of Mark's Gospel an occasion is recounted when the disciples had been debating which of them was the greatest. Of course, they were rather embarrassed when Jesus asked them what they had been discussing. Jesus explained to them that in his kingdom leaders, including himself, would have to follow a remarkably different model from that of the rulers of the day, he said:

"Whoever wants to be first must take last place and be the servant of everyone else".

We have also had the announcement on the 8th of March of the new bishop of Huddersfield, The Revd Canon Smitha Prasadam, who is currently Chaplain of St Albans, Copenhagen. I'm sure that her ordination as bishop will bear many similarities to the of the coronation of King Charles. It will take place in a great cathedral with choirs and pageantry, and I'm sure that all including us will be wishing her well.

Of course the most important thing for both our new king and our new bishop is that they enter into their new roles with the attitude of the servant king, Jesus. That they will seek to use their position's, and the authority and privilege that comes with them, for the benefit of others.

I cannot promise that our annual meeting will have the same kind of pageantry but it will offer the people of our Churches, particularly those who offer to take up offices, join our PCC, or one of our steering groups, the opportunity to live out the same kind of calling. To serve God by putting other people before ourselves.

Just when we were thinking of turning our thermostats down a tad, the snow bomb fell causing disruption to transport, schools, weekend plans, sending us scurrying to find the thick woolly jumpers once again!

Hopefully, by the time you are actually reading this magazine, everything will be as it should be – warmer, sunnier days, spring flowers everywhere and the promises of hope, joy and new life about to be fulfilled once again as we celebrate Easter.

Have a very happy, joyful and greener Easter – think Fair Trade and sustainability when buying Chocolate Eggs, sweet treats, cards and flowers.

Now in case we forget:-

A few Eco tips for the month of April sent to us by the Diocese of Leeds: In the Bathroom:

- 1. Spend less time in the shower. Spending one minute less in the shower each day will save up to £7 off your energy bills, per person each year. Heating water uses a lot of energy. (O dear, I used to love a nice deep bubbly bath.)
- 2. Turn off the tap while cleaning your teeth. The clean water that flows out of your tap needs energy in many stages of its processing and transporting before it reaches your tap –do not waste it. (I'll do my best!)
- 3. Fit a water efficient shower head (if you've got a shower that takes hot water straight from the boiler or hot water tank) This will reduce your hot water usage whilst retaining the sensation of a powerful shower. (Super!)
- 4. Switch to Eco cleaning products which bio degrade in the sewerage system and don't damage aquatic life in our rivers and seas. (There are now a lot of really pleasant products to choose from which smell nice -mmmm)

Crossroads Foodbank News

Raising our profile within the community is vital. We don't receive any council or state funding – we spend big on staple foodstuffs, and we're aiming for self-sufficiency within the project. Donations of food and money keep rolling in, even after the season of giving, but there's never enough to rest on our laurels. We all need friends, and we can't make too many of them.



Bearing this in mind, we fired off a letter to our local MP Jason McCartney inviting him to come round and see what we do, and how we operate. The reply came back straight away, telling us that he'd be delighted to pop in on the 18th. The fact is, he could be useful to us, and we could be useful to him. After all, he's a helpful guy – he recently helped out with visa applications for a Ukrainian family who I'm hosting.

Good as his word, he duly turned up on one of his well-earned days off, and we gave him the lowdown on the Crossroads Centre with its varied facilities and the running of the Foodbank. Not content with visiting just to press the flesh, he was forensic in his questioning of what we do for our clients. We explained that we're not in the business of providing for people *ad infinitum* – we engage with clients early on, to see what we can do to help them help themselves. We don't like dependency – it takes the spirit away (neither can we afford it). One of our roles is to keep reaching out to the vulnerable, and he's now gone off knowing that he can signpost constituents to our service.

Suffer the little children to come unto me... and they came! More specifically, we were delighted to receive the toddlers from Meltham Pre-school playgroup earlier in the month for a tour. They'd had a story read to them called "It's a no money day", about a family who needed support with food. Friends and families gave them food to donate, which they passed on to us. Needless to say, they enjoyed their trip,

helped put things away on our shelves, and our volunteers liked fussing over them! They're the next generation, and it's vital that they learn the merit and worth of helping those less fortunate than themselves. One day they may

volunteer for us...

TODDLER CHURCH

The Meltham Parish Toddler Church was started in September 2022 based at Helme Church. This location was deliberately chosen as being the best venue in that most church-based events and groups currently take place in the more central area of Meltham and we wanted to set up a church-based event that would be better placed to reach out to the families living in the northern part of the parish.

We called it "Toddler Church" for a specific reason because it is not a Playgroup or Mums & Tots Group. It is part of the life and ministry of Meltham Christ the King Parish and is a "Fresh Expression" of what church is because it is just as much part of church as what happens on Sundays and Wednesday mornings.

We have a very enthusiastic and talented Team who all bring their different gifts and expertise to the weekly Toddler Church sessions with each member contributing to providing a smooth and seamless 2-hour session. Each session includes playtime, a themed craft, Bible story time (with singing action choruses and prayer), snacks and then finishing off with singing nursery rhymes.

Since starting last September, we have been encouraged by the new contacts that have been made, and have welcomed a total of 20 toddlers, with 16 adults, over the 17 sessions that have taken place. Of course, they don't all come every week but we have had an average weekly attendance of 5 children each week and this has been a manageable number of toddlers and also enabled the team to chat with, and get to know, the Mums, Dads and Grandparents who come along.

Because of the rising costs of heating, with the reduction of church services on Sundays, we couldn't justify continuing to hold Toddler Church every week and so we decided during the first 3 months of 2023, to just hold a monthly Toddler Church event and these were special "Storytime", "Pancakes" and "Mother's Day" events.

As the weather begins to warm up, and the snow becomes a distant memory, then we hope to re-launch Toddler Church on a weekly basis after Easter with vigorous publicity that will reach out to, and attract, more toddlers and their families to Toddler Church.

If I was to sum up the reason for, and motivation of Toddler Church, it is to "Tell People About Jesus" and this is just part of Meltham Parish's mission and outreach strategy.

Philip's Apple


Recently, while visiting Peter Rolls we were reminiscing about St James church, in particular the apple on the lectern. Peter disappeared for ten minutes returning with an A4 sheet of information. He knew exactly what he was looking for and where it was. Peter's memories, additional information from others and help by email from Wendy Newby, our past church warden, results in the following story

we would like to share with you all.

Maybe you have never noticed the beautifully crafted wooden apple at the feet of the golden eagle on the lectern in the sanctuary of St James's church? Maybe you have and wondered why it is there.

Philip Stead, was at the time, church warden of St James's.

Wendy says "One Harvest Festival when our girls, Leah and Rebecca were still small, one of them, we think it was Leah as she had a special relationship with Philip, was walking around church with some apples.



She put an apple between the eagle's legs, called Philip over and said "Look Philip, the eagle has laid an egg!" Philip, dissolved into his inimitable giggles. Whenever it was mentioned in future years it could still make him laugh. We continued to put an apple there each Harvest time. I was asked to give a eulogy at Philip's funeral and used this little family story to exemplify Philip's gentleness, kindness and love of children, his deep knowledge and adherence to tradition but his willingness to make changes when they were right, and last but not least his wonderfully simple and innocent sense of humour".

When this story was heard at Philip's funeral, Raymond Lodge a member of St James's church had an apple turned in wood and vicar Jane Austin, agreed that it be permanently placed on the lectern. During a service in January 1999 the apple was dedicated to Philip's memory. Philip is, and always will be, a part of the fabric at St James' both physically and spiritually. As Raymond commented at the time, "One of the last gentlemen of Meltham, nothing Philip liked better than a story and I hope in time to come, the story of the apple will be told many times.

Peter Rolls and I, look forward to getting together again to reveal some facts about the candlesticks!



What does Easter mean to me?

Recently I was asked to write an informative post about the Christian faith and Easter for Ridley and Hall. This is the result. (by Nigel Priestly)

The world is an amazing place – so why aren't we happier?

Research suggests that despite the fact that there have been significant gains for many people in income, education and opportunities in comparison with previous generations, we are not as happy or content as we might be. A recent Harvard study shows that more than half the people who turn 50 want more meaning and significance in the second half of their lives.

I run a Zoom Alpha Course – it's a course to explore what the Christian faith is about. The first session addresses the question "Is there more to Life Than This?" It's a good question. Despite all the gains, this question remains unanswered for many. Working in a law firm can show us the best and worst of human behaviour – relationship breakdowns, battles over children, parents failing to care for their children, siblings fighting over their inheritance – or lack of it. We see so much injustice, disappointment, lack of forgiveness and despair.

Outside work, there are our own experiences of grief, sadness and anger – illness striking down relatives or friends suddenly out of the blue. Or our own personal failings – why did I do or say that?

Is this all there is? Is there no hope? Is death the end?

Easter for Christians is about hope and grace. We believe that there is a Godshaped space in our lives. We were all made to be in a relationship with God who loves us. How can He know what our lives are like? How can we know what God is like? We believe that Jesus is the Son of God – at Christmas we celebrate his birth to live among us. In his life he showed the nature of God – on the side of the poor, challenging the status quo, healing, forgiving the apparently unforgiveable, teaching about prayer and about the centrality of loving God our Father and one another. God delights in giving people a second chance

This teaching did not go down well with the religious and political authorities of his time. Jesus was arrested, tried unjustly, tortured and then on Good Friday suffered crucifixion – a terrible, painful death having his body nailed to a cross. The authorities believed that this have been the end of Jesus' influence.

It wasn't! Christians believe that on Easter Day Jesus was raised from the dead. He was seen by many. Death wasn't the end and it isn't for us. He had suffered the worst that humans can do and defeated it. So that's why we celebrate Easter.

We have an upside down view of the world – our worth is not measured by material gain. Meaning in life comes from knowing an always forgiving God who understands and has experienced our failings, our hurts, capacity for injustice and cruelty and wants to make us whole.

'The Heads Up Choir' Singing with Dementia

It is widely accepted that music and especially song and singing can be enjoyed by everyone! In Meltham we have seen the popularity of choirs, band's and individual



musicians. Side By Side Meltham, a group running very successfully since 2014 has included singing as part of the plan for weekly session. This group is for those with memory problems, mainly dementia.

The 'Heads Up Choir' is a new venture. Run by volunteers and a professional musician. The focus will be to give support to those who attend who are suffering the effects of memory loss.

We know that singing can improve behaviour, mood and cognitive function.

It will meet at the Salvation Army Church at Lindley on a Monday

The participants will be those people who have dementia and those who care for them. There will be a small charge of £3 to those who attend.



Helme Ladies usually meet Tuesdays in the Church Hall at 10am.




Lent Reflections.




